It addresses challenges such as higher costs, modern lifestyle constraints, and technological limitations. The research also seeks to dispel the misconception that the new classic style is inflexible and heavily reliant on aesthetic richness alone.

To explore these themes, various methods were employed, including data collection and evaluation, observation, quantitative analysis, and psychophysical methods. These approaches allowed for a comprehensive analysis of the new classic style's adaptability across different building types, spaces, and cultural contexts. The study also examined the psychological and emotional impacts of this style on occupants.

The research resulted in a practical designed for interior designers and enthusiasts, offering guidelines for effectively incorporating the new classic style in contemporary designs. This aims to help balance luxury with visual lightness in various settings, particularly in modern tourist destinations and the hotel industry, providing a detailed approach for applying this style in diverse interior spaces

I. INTRODUCTION

The purpose of this research is to change the common perception of the unsuitability of the new classic style in many interior architecture spaces due to its excessive details and its mismatch with the contemporary spirit of modern and sophisticated means that demand visual lightness in the elements of interior architecture used [68]. The research discussed the origins of its use in revolutionary classical orientation classical orientation Revolutionary ,Realistic classic Revolutionary, orientation ideal, as it aimed to achieve a balanced use of the new classic style in interior architecture designs [19]. The research tried to determine how to improve the new classic style in the designs of our current spaces, in order to achieve luxury and ease of use [63]. The main problem that this research addressed is the lack of popularity of the New classic visual heaviest in many interior architecture designs and the persistence of its old concept [15]. The researcher followed a sequence in various parts of the research by developing specific design elements for the new classic style that combine visual lightness and luxurious after studying the application of the new classic style in hotels in France, which was common in hotels [18]. The research also dealt with its use in other types of buildings besides hotels, comparing its use in Egypt, which is mostly simple in most of its designs and tends to lower the cost of implementing most of its designs, with its use in Gulf countries, which need luxury and are not concerned with setting cost limits in most of their designs [39].

hypothesis was a deficiency in people's thinking and culture in the possibilities of interior architecture to achieve a balance between visual lightness to try to spread this style in its new concept to serve many of our building spaces and apply its use in many types of buildings [69].

The research work:

• Data collection

The research collected data about the historical origins and features of various classical styles, such as Greek, Roman, Renaissance, Baroque, Rococo, and Neoclassical [50].

• Evaluate data.

The research used various sources such as books, journals, websites and magazines on the use of New classic Style in Interior design of hotels [40].

Evaluated the research basic through analysis and studying New classic Interior aspects of colour, texture, furniture to get visual lightness and luxurious impression in Newclassic [16].

• Observation methods.

The research chased several examples of buildings that used the New classic style in Interior Architecture, such as residental units, commercial spaces, cultural centres and public facilities

• Quantitative methods.

The research used this method as descriptive statistic and comparative analysis to measure, compare the performance, and satisfaction of New classic style in different types of

buildings as conducted a case study on the difference and similarities between the New classic style in the Gulf region and Egypt used unmovable architecture components such as walls, floors, ceilings [1]. Comparative analysis of the New Classic style: Descriptive statistics and performance evaluation in Gulf and Egyptian architecture.

Psychophysical methods.

These methods entail evaluating the Individual responses of human to different stimuli through Interior spaces. [39] **Body Text.**

The researcher determined the main components and rules of the New Classic style, such as symmetry, proportion, harmony, ornamentation, and elegance, the strengths and weakness of New Classic style in terms of aesthetics, functionality, sustainability, and cultural relevance so the researcher also suggested some recommendations and guidelines for future research as following: [15]

1. Justification for the emergence of new classical architecture.

Between 400 and 500 BC, the classical style of Greek, Hellenistic, and Roman art emerged in the Renaissance under a new name, The Neoclassical 1770–1830. Numerous world leaders, including Napoleon in France, Stalin in the Soviet Union, and Hitler in Germany, promoted it as a unique architectural art [31]

At the start of the nineteenth century, there was a strong sentiment for history and nostalgia. At the end of the classical era in 1830, the neo-classical style emerged as a living for historic architectural forms (Greek-Roman-Byzantine-Romantic-Gothic-Renaissance-Baroque), and a wave of multiplexes followed [64]

The first half of the nineteenth century saw two types of trends in several historic neighbourhoods:

First historic model: the use and full expression of ancient historical architectural models [14]

Second historical model: Choose several models based on the colour and style the designer is going for [42]

In terms of architecture, classicism is all about ascendance, dominance, and victory. The architect and designer of the new classical style were determined to include many of its historical distinctiveness in a contemporary manner appropriate to the times [36]

The building's worst flaw is that when we examine structures from this new era (Neoclassic), we can never tell when they were constructed, and the interior features can only be identified by looking at how they serve their intended functions. For instance: [32]

Hotels, office buildings, and commercial buildings Its architecture, interior design components, and vocabulary were all developed as a result of the industrial revolution, and they are contemporary patterns to attain new functional characteristics [28]

The search issue was the introduction of unexpressed elements and the appearance of abnormalities in the vocabulary of interior architecture [46]

So Based on the foregoing, the researcher divided the study into five sections:

The New Classic began to emerge after the classic model that had a long history in Europe, where the Palladianism municipal style had a proportion of the Italian architects Bladim Palladio that accompanied the Renaissance and helped the emergence of the neoclassical on the European continent and America and began spreading for several reasons: [34]

- The emergence of the French enlightenment movement on the European continent, which was based on consistent technical rules based on the laws of nature and rational logic [29]
- Baroque mood and acceptance of the logic of basic geometric forms were rejected as a result of the influence of the Enlightenment movement in that the perspective of the French Revolution was Roman architecture and that it was an example of the French Revolution architecture [33]

1/1 First orientation (revolutionary classical orientation).

It emphasizes (Fig. 1), powerful expressions, components, and motifs, the specifics are evident.

1/2 Rational Revolutionary New Classic

The end-of-the-eighteenth-century period, particularly in France, marked the beginning of a crucial phase in the development of classical architecture, which is what this name denotes. It started and grew under the enlightenment movement, leading to the progressive extension of the opulent life of the Baroque period and a number of architectural streams in this direction that may be categorized into the following categories. [24]

1/2/1 First direction

It is built on a realistic approach and has served as the foundation for numerous architectural projects across various European nations.

1/2/2 Second direction.

Its initiatives have devolved into a simple intellectual inventory that does not apply, it is based more on imagination than on obvious reality, and it rarely has an applied orientation [25]

A.Classical Orientation Revolutionary Realistic.

It emphasizes(Fig. 2), the idea of wisdom and rationality, and I simply describe classic beauty as rejecting he pricey

emphasis on ornamentation and designthat was popular during the Baroque and Rocco periods. Instead, they go for the simplification and clarity of geometric forms. [25]

- Features of architectural work done by architects of this orientation.
- -Removing the accumulated impurities of architecture and using engineering laws that are logical and forms that are true. Pantheon has had various phases.

In 1755,

- St. Genevieve Church was built in the late Barue style with many of architectural elements (Fig. 3),
- Following those changes, the building's design was simplified and the additions were restricted to those that solely represented classical architecture from antiquity [68]

-This church underwent modifications in 1971 to become the Pantheon des Grands Hommes, a national hall of fame. The windows were covered and the decorative components were simplified by removing them from the orientation of the building.

B.Classic revolutionary orientation ideal (fantasy).

It came close to ideal thinking and imaginary thinking despite(Fig. 4), its classical origins and tilted to simplicity, amplification, and power of expression, qualities that never existed before in classics and whose architecture was characterized by a set of abstract forms that conformed to the laws of cosmology and rationality, great developments and presented ideas that went beyond the concepts of that era happened, Then architectural style has been developed in a highly purified manner to be used in ideal designs.

in public buildings, architectural blocks were selected that characterized by purity and serenity by huge standards, the most important work reflecting the design of the Paris Zoom Library in 1785. The exterior facades have become almost uninformed cubes and reading halls are covered with a huge roof that takes the form of a half-barrel vault. [30]

His project (Monument) was widely known as Newton Issac (Cenotaph), which is one of the modes of the architecture of Architecture parlante, where Ledoux developed this concept with the help of Lequeu & Boullee and relies fundamentally on a focus on the project's objective.

The monument uses a huge ball (150 m high). The interior is perforated as a symbol of star-studded skies, and it is the tip of what has reached modern architecture. Not only has the works of this architecture spread to France but it has spread elsewhere on the European continent. The most famous architects interested in this thought are Gilly in Germany, Hansen in Denmark, and Soane in England. [63]

1/2/2 Second direction (romantic orientation).

It is a combination of architectural quality and natural beauty in the form of a new Greek model. The architects used precise architectural details of homogeneous proportions and quoted forms of ancient classical architecture (Fig. 5), Its most famous pioneers are Robert Adam R. Adam and John Nashar J.Nash in England, percier in France [62]

Classics began as an architectural orientation that opens up new areas of its life in the following centuries. In the second half of the twentieth century, classics began in a new form called Post Modern Architecture. [37]

Which has taken its most important elements from the past, and added other modern elements.

SO, the researcher summarized the most important elements of the model for Neo-Classics from the Post-Modern style as: [35]

- -the multitude of architectural elements mixed elements from the past and modern in this style.
- -Explicit architecture people understand. [57]
- -Use decoration, imagination, and excitement (use old architecture vocabulary to decorate modern architecture).
- -Regionalism (culture climate topography).
- -Using various kinds of finishes in discordant colours side by side, some streets and fields have become a carnival or fashion show.
- -The absolute freedom of the architect to design buildings and this freedom is not based on foundations or principles [2]

2. The luxurious impression of New Classic in the interior architecture of hotels in France.

The New Classic model was mentioned earlier in specific buildings like hotels as a good example of the New Classic model in its interior, Where French classics appeared in the interior architecture of hotels in the 18th century AD, At those times, French land had a remarkable recovery in the purchase of luxury collectibles and interest in more precise details in the Neo-Classic interior architecture vocabulary. This led to changes and additions to new interior architectural elements in the classical style and was used innovatively by mixing with other models to produce a distinctive new model, the New Classic.

Below are several New Classic-style hotel models in France that showcase the distinctive features of modern classics [30] 2/1.Hotel in 1728 by the Chevalier Antoine Mazin, architect of King Louis XV's arsenals, the Hotel on the rue d'Anjou reflects the inventive classicism of its founder

The New Classic appeared in its distinctive form, which was established in 1728 and was subsequently divided into a collection of apartments in 1951. Modifications were made in the 18th century, where munificent to his Neo Classic (Fig. 6)

2/3. L'A ubergade

Michel Trama and his wife Maryse thought to establish Aubergade in Puymirol, this house included Distinctive interior architectural elements such as pale stone walls, a majestic staircase, antique hexagonal floor tiles, a series of salons and interior courtyards, huge glazed surfaces, galleries, terraces, a swimming pool, a walled garden, a marriage of ecru and white.

Many changes and modifications had been done to this house (Fig. 15) in 2002, and completed finally in 2006, as the architect Yves Boucharlat connects the two main poles of this attractive Place to stay. Three sloping roofs with antique tiles of New Classic style, in a summer dining room where fresh and to recreate the style of the tobacco drying rooms of old to achieve a good connection of many elements in soothing white wood has been chosen for the new kitchens old classic style as the stone floor to the beams, via stucco chandeliers mixed elements of modern to present New classic style as pre cotton covers on the wrought-iron furniture.[55]




Figure 46: Colour Palette





Figure 62: New classic furniture in Egypt.




Figure 65: Comparison of furniture styles in Gulf states &Egypt. (author, 2024)





Figure 66: Comparison of Colours used Gulf states & Egypt (author, 2024).





Figure 67: Comparison of proportionality and consistency in Gulf states & Egypt. (author, 2024)




Figure 68: Comparison of Decorative Elements in Gulf states &Egypt. (author, 2024)

The units of measurement are specific design elements that serve this part of the research and came in various and different forms ,results were comprehensive for each method followed by the research, so data collection helped to reach results on New classic, historical origins, Evaluated data helped to analyze multiple realistic models of the neoclassical, observation methods helped to deal with and observe the difference in applying the neoclassical in multiple buildings, quantitively methods helped to achieve a comparison between performance & satisfaction of new classic style in different types of buildings and finally psychophysical methods that measure The reactions of people with different cultures towards interior spaces.

All these results allow to make basics of models of new classic through practical thinking.

Practical Thinking Steps to Design Apartments of New classical style.




Figure 69: plane of apartment

The Methods follow to design the apartment.

Develop functional areas such as Living room, sleeping areas, kitchen area, bathroom, and storage area.

- Form concept for the design that concentrates basically on functional purposes as working with a structure divided into independent Interior units to be essay to change their functions when re-assembling their units in new forming [21].

Design studies for the apartment.

- recreate the kitchen in a triangle workspace to line the main Interior items in one line.
- put the dining table to organize the circulation to the kitchen and to overlap the corridor between the entrance to the kitchen and utility room, as the dining table in the living rooms is placed to not block kitchen equipment and not overlap the passage in the entrance to the kitchen.
- Adding areas for watching T.V can be designed from solid wood, and a fireplace can be put for heating and as a functional zone and basic element of Neoclassic Style.
- Shelves for books can be put near to the window, a coffee area

with a round table and chair also add in a separated zone by textiles, also can have flowers with a lot of lights

- places for shoes, outerwear wardrobe, and hooks can be used in the Living rooms.
- It is possible to install a full-fledged bed in the two rooms with the same function one of them but since the bedroom is small.
- More lights had to be put focused on the dressing table.
- using the not traditional model of air conditioning as there is no wall left in the bedroom
- small interior spaces in the bathroom were moved to combine with the room. (author, 2024).

Theoretical substantiation of design engineering

- a door was used to separate each room, and the arrangement of functional zones in the apartment was affected by structural features.
- The central location was occupied by the dining area, move comfortably around the kitchen can be done by free space around the table.
- In the bedroom, the furniture was arranged by the size and position of the window.
- the sofa was arranged in the centre of the room in the Living room, which is used to attract the eye and other objects around it.
- Main focus can be done by the fireplace portal and TV.
- Changing clothes and shoes next to the door helps to reduce the pollution of the room plan functionality to accommodate several people.
- the standard layout is used in the bathroom, where drawers and shelves hide and allow storing a lot of cosmetics. The restroom has cabinets for household items like a broom, mop, rag, etc.(author, 2024).

Compositional apartment was used to redesign the apartment in New Classic Style.

Symmetry is the best way to express the New Classic Style which leads to maintaining visual balance and emphasizing the compositional centre in the interior design of spaces. On the other hand, symmetry in New Classic help to create a balanced composition, so it considers an essential element of New Classic Style.

Some spaces like kitchen are difficult to implement New Classic on it or it can be applied, but to a limited extent as put wall panels, the most space that uses symmetry wildly is the bedrooms and living room, TV watching space because the distribution of furniture in this place helps reasonably.

Symmetry can be a limited realization in other spaces like coffee areas, and entrance halls, (Fig. 70) as we can find it on limited elements of Interior design as on the walls by colour proportions, materials that present New Classic style well. (author, 2024).

Dark wood is part of the New Classic style that helps connect plaid fabric and monotonous surfaces balanced.

The entrance hall is used to connect rooms that have no windows, so light colours are used on various walls, the floor, and the ceiling they used to give visual weight. (author, 2024).




Figure 76: percentages of new classic style usage by rooms
